Aro residents are wanted to help shape some key policies for the Aro Valley Community Council (AVCC) – and even volunteer to be on the council.

The AVCC has in principle approved new policies for how it deals with its finances, conflicts of interest, and employment. These cover issues including how it approves spending.

Wellington City Council staff member Jenny Rains, who attended the last AVCC meeting, said the city council was reviewing its funding for all community centres, and having good policies mattered.

"We need to be confident that the organisation is strong with really good policies and processes in place."

The city council would look at those issues over the next few months, talk to the AVCC, and make a decision on funding in June this year, as it does on a regular basis.

Local beer now on sale from Garage Project

Locals enjoyed the 'soft launch' of the cellar door last month (see picture).

Eight different beers are now on tap at any one time, with more than available in bottles. Residents can bring in their own reusable bottles or use bottles provided on-site.

Some beers will be available on site before they are sold anywhere else in town, and buyers can try out different beers before they buy.

The beer is likely to be sold at around \$10 a litre, for a couple of hours each

evening – to allow people to come in after work – and during weekends, although fixed hours have not been set.

The Garage Project also hopes to run more beerrelated events, following last year's extremely successful Wellington on a Plate dinner.

Another spin-off from the opening of the cellar door has been the much-awaited removal of the six foot high fence topped with barbed wire that divided the garage space from Aro Street.

Council warns residents over tree removal

Wellington City Council is warning residents not to cut down trees in public spaces, following the dispute over a sycamore cut down behind the community centre.

David Spencer, the council's aboriculture manager, is reminding residents (see letter below) that they should contact the council before doing anything with trees on public land.

Dear Aro Valley,

Following your article about the removal of a tree by a member of the public near Aro Valley Park, I just wanted to remind your readers that we are here to help.

Residents with questions or concerns about Council-owned trees should contact us. One of our arborists will come out and inspect the tree and schedule in any necessary work. Work like this needs to be done safely and professionally.

It is also worth remembering that it is illegal to chop down trees in public spaces and people who do so may face a fine and potentially be prosecuted for criminal damage.

Valley food supply set for shake-up

A new addition to Kai o te Aro's gardening team is keen to get more residents and businesses involved in composting, as part of plans to transform the way we produce and buy our food.

Kelvin Aris, who spent last year living on a permaculture farm in Turangi, is keen to "close the loop" in the Valley's green waste.

Having moved into a flat on Epuni Street, he is using some of Kai o te Aro's grant funding to explore ways to make it easier for local people and shops to compost – and then use that compost to grow amazing fresh food.

Aris has talked to local businesses about composting their green waste, and already has a couple of bags of wood shavings from Ron Barber's shop on Aro Street. Coffee grounds from Aro Café, spent hops from the Garage Project brewery, and fruit and veg scraps from the green grocer are all on the list as well.

Part of the idea is to strengthen the community by building a "web" of connections between businesses, residents and gardeners — using the food supply as a natural connector.

For residents, meanwhile, gardening and composting can be in the 'too hard' basket, but Aris — who is himself still getting to grips with it — says he wants to "demystify" the process. "I'm struggling myself to start a garden, because there are so many gaps in my knowledge. But it's actually not very complicated."

Aris has a large garden at the top of his flat, which can be accessed from Levina Avenue and which he wants to turn into another community garden.

One idea is to use it to grow garlic

One idea is to use it to grow garlic. "I'd like to do a couple of open workshop days in our top garden, working on mulching and so on, getting things ready, and then plant the seed crop that will be used next year for getting a local garlic supply."

Other things growing naturally can also be put to use, Aris says. Nasturtiums, which grow wild, have seeds that can be pickled like capers, and wild fennel can be used in an Italian-style pasta, or to marinate fish.

Local food is good in so many ways, he adds. "The only way for us to feel confident in our food supply is for us to localise as much as possible. It's what has to happen, because the current food supply puts us at so much risk. It's expensive, you end up eating so many chemicals — and God knows where it comes from."

In the last 5 years hardcourt bike polo has taken the world by storm, and the Aro Valley is no exception.

The sport has actually been around for some time and originated in Ireland in 1891 as an alternative to horse polo. However, the modern hardcourt version, played on concrete rather than grass, was kick-started by a bunch of bored Seattle bike couriers in their down time.

Now, twice a week a bunch of happygo-lucky girls and guys play polo on the Aro Valley's community basketball court. The Wellington Bike Polo group was formed about 18 months ago and has grown to more than 20 people, ranging in ages from late teens to mid-40s.

It's an unusual sport to watch but lots of fun to play – mostly because there are few accidents and the rules are simple to learn. Teams are made up of three players and the first team to score five goals wins.

The fledgling bike polo community in New Zealand is going from strength to strength, and next month Caroline Bay in Timaru will host the Australasian champs. Teams from Australia and New Zealand will battle it out for a spot at this year's world champs in the United States, and a few teams from the Aro Valley are making the trip south for the big event.

It's not all serious stuff, though, and the group prides itself on its more laidback approach to the game. In this corner of Wellington, polo is really about getting together with a bunch of friends, meeting new people and having fun on bikes for a couple of hours.

New members of any age and ability are always welcome. It's free to play and the group has spare bikes and polo mallets for new players. The group meets at 6pm on Tuesday and 3pm on Saturday at the community basketball court.



Rebuilding the Town Belt in the Aro Valley



A large number of Aro Valleyites presented oral submissions on the city council's Draft Town Belt Management Plan last month. Co-chair Madeleine Rashbrooke spoke on behalf of the AVCC, and committee members Julia Stace, Gareth Rouch, and Mattie Timmer were among those from the Valley who also made short presentations in

support of their written submissions.

Thanks to everybody who made an online, written or oral submission – it was time well spent as the city councillors said that they were very impressed by the quantity and quality of the submissions that had come from the Aro Valley.

Presenters came away with the impression that our strong arguments in favour of maintaining the Devon Street Gully as green space, ideally as part of the Town Belt, may have persuaded councillors to reconsider the draft plan's omission of this area. The

councillors also seemed interested in the AVCC's suggestion that adding reserve land on Adams Terrace and protecting bush on the northern side of the valley would provide a link from Polhill Gully to the edge of the Terrace. A proposal to make a track through the bush between Aro Street and Kelburn Parade was also well received.

Flyover and supercity

Greetings and best wishes for the New Year!

Current issues for me as a councillor include: public transport fares, the Wellington Bus Review, safe cycle ways, urban design for the Basin Reserve precinct, cessation of toxic methyl bromide use on our wharves, and the Natural Resource Management Plan. Basin Reserve Flyover – Following the decision to proceed with Memorial Park tunnel, my successful motion to

Greater Wellington Regional Council looked to ensure that decisions on roading alterations in the vicinity of the Basin Reserve took into account good urban design and the potential of public transport to reduce congestion. By the time you read this newsletter, Wellington City Council will also have ruled on a preferred option. I would like to know, what does the Basin Reserve mean to you? How do you think this area can be improved for the benefit of the whole city?

Governance – A "one" tier structure has a single rating authority with options for relatively weak community boards that have no statutory powers. The two tier system would have a single rating regional authority but include local boards with statutory powers replacing city and district councils. Local boards would have differentiated services and

funding outcomes with targeted rating mechanisms, and could also include community boards and local committees.

My main concern is that decisions are made close to affected communities. Last year, I facilitated the Wellington workshops run by Giovanni Allegretti, a leading expert on Participatory Budgeting. Those of you who attended the workshop will now be aware how this methodology enables towns and communities to determine their own priorities and level of funding in an efficient manner, and in the process increases participation. I would be delighted to come and speak to you about Participatory Budgeting and share my experience with the process in Porto Alegre, where it originated. I would also like to hear more on concerns that your association has on proposed governance structures. There will be several more rounds of consultation this year, possibly concluding with a referendum on a single or two tier governance structure for the region. The Local Government Commission will determine what system will be used for the 2016 election. Finally, I would be delighted to talk to you or your group on any issue at all. Very best wishes for 2013!


ARO VALLEY FAIR

Bernie Grice

2 July 1932 - 21 February 2013

Teacher, actor, poet, activist, lover of bird and bush...and clutter... forever recycling, creating something out of nothing, seeing new possibilities where another might have seen only rubbish....

Bernie moved into Aston Towers in 2000, after living many years

in Thorndon. He was a regular visitor to the Community Centre until his move to Sprott House in December 2007, where he lived out his remaining years.

Bernie was fifth in a family of 13 children and grew up in the Waikato, the son of a sharemilker, attending Morrinsville High.

Bernie was an early political opponent of New Zealand sporting relations with South Africa's apartheid regime and was a founding member of the

Citizens All Black Tour Association (CABTA) in 1959, formed when the New Zealand Rugby Football Union declared Maori players ineligible for selection on South Africa's request.

In 1992, Bernie was invited to South Africa by the African National Congress to help monitor the first post-apartheid elections as an international observer.

He leaves behind daughter Huia, son Tane, and old mate and Aro Valley resident, Pam Ormsby.
